PPS: Someone contacted me early this morning (Friday) to ask about the situation at the Blackisle Wildlife Park. The Park had its Zoo Licence removed and then tried to circumvent the law by remaining open (without charging any admission fee but asking for donations to feed the animals) while getting rid of their exotic animals and applying for a Public Entertainments Licence (PEL) which would allow them to charge visitors to their "new" petting zoo with only domestic animals. We have lodged an objection to the granting of a PEL on the grounds that part of the reason they lost their Zoo Licence was because they didn't take care of their domestic animals properly. The PEL should be considered by Highland Council any day now.
